SYNTHETIC RELIGION

- Once known as the Crossroads Movement
- Also now known as the International Churches of Christ
- Still often referred to as the Boston Movement
- Founded by Kip McKean in the late '70s

- Perhaps not as prevalent in name as it once was, but the influence is still seen.
- They believe many of the same things we do and many things we are accused of they are also accused of. (But that's another study)
- •In some ways, these similarities make the danger all the more subtle and easier to slip in.

Main features:

- "Discipling"
 - Each new convert is assigned a "discipler" whom they are to follow and defer to in all matters where they can live, where they can work, who they can date or marry, even what color shirt they can wear.
- •This creates a pyramid of disciples and churches with Kip McKean at the top.

Main features:

- "Confessionals"
 - Members must tell everything to higher-ranking members. This involves hours-long emotional group confessions.
- They cite James 5:16 to justify this.
- Does this practice agree with Matthew 18:15-17?

- •The hierarchy who is Lord?
 - Christ or man?
 - Scripturally, only elders are given (limited) authority, not "disciplers" given absolute control.
 - No authorization for "Pillar Churches"

- Confessionals for God or man?
 - Rather than promote repentance and righteousness, they are designed to stir the emotions.
 - If someone wants the leave the Boston Movement, the information divulged in confession sessions is used to emotionally blackmail them.

- •Constant praise and flattery is given and can be withdrawn as a form of control over any aspect of life. They are emotionally blackballed.
- •This is not love, it is emotional manipulation! (Jude 16) It preys on the human need to feel like a part of something.
- Compare to scriptural withdrawal that continues to demonstrate love as a means to spur repentance and Godly sorrow.

- Many leave movements influenced by this after a few years.
- •It is a spiritual and emotional meat-grinder.
 - They leave with bitterness and anger.
 - Because of emotional manipulation by those that claim to be Christians, many will not seek God again after this.

- •Values quantity over quality. No true growth is fostered, just continual churning out of disciples.
- •Based on emotion rather than knowledge of the Truth. (2 Timothy 3:6-7)
 - Emotion certainly has a place, but it is not a means nor a primary end.
 - Truth will not come from emotion, but emotion from truth.

- How to guard against groups like this:
 - Be firmly grounded in truth.
 - Seek to follow Jesus.
 - Our loyalties should not be to any man, tradition, creed, or group. Not even the "Church of Christ" as it is thought of by many!
